

C.C.A.A.R.R.T.T Model

The C.C.A.A.R.R.T.T. (Communication, Cultural Connections, Awareness, Addiction, Recreation, Racism, Technology, Transportation) Model is an integrated collective impact strategy to address the needs of intercultural seniors living in Surrey, one of Canada's most diverse communities. It addresses the social inclusion needs of all seniors 55+ through the implementation of initiatives designed to better integrate services for immigrant, indigenous, LGBTQ2+, the general population and seniors with disabilities. The C.C.A.A.R.R.T.T. Model will engage collaborating partners to identify and implement collective impact initiatives addressing intercultural social inclusion needs of seniors in each of the six Town Centres in Surrey

The goal of the C.C.A.A.R.R.T.T. Model is to create a common agenda with concrete outcomes to be achieved within a five-year period, which will increase seniors' engagement within the communities where they live, with particular emphasis on immigrants, indigenous and persons with disabilities seniors. This intercultural collective impact approach will address systemic barriers to these vulnerable populations, and provide opportunities for more integrated programming, breaking down cultural biases and creating greater awareness, appreciation and acceptance of all cultures in the community.

The C.C.A.A.R.R.T.T. Model's intercultural senior inclusion collective impact initiatives align with the New Horizons for Senior's Program Objectives to:

- Build the collective capacity of collaborating organizations to recognize and address barriers to social inclusion faced by seniors
- Promote improved access to information, programs, and services for seniors to enhance their social inclusion within their communities
- Support action research to understand and implement effective approaches for increasing the level of social inclusion of seniors in their communities
- Develop innovative approaches to engage and retain senior volunteers to improve their social inclusion in their communities through ongoing, sustainable systems
- Address systemic barriers that contribute to the social exclusion of seniors by creating ongoing change models that continue to ensure these barriers are reduced or removed
